2.12 How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes:

Annual academic plan is made by IQAC and all the departments and faculty members are insisted to follow plans. Periodic Monitoring, Suggestions and Improvement were done. IQAC conducts presentations sessions before Peer group and management. IQAC organises periodic meetings with stakeholders and regular meetings with teachers for their suggestions. IQAC also insists evaluation of teachers by the students. IQAC gives suggestions based on the feedback from the students, alumni, parents, LMC and DES administration.As per the feedback date which are analyzed by respective departments,Mentors are informed and remedial measures are ensured.IQAC also ensures an efficient mentoring system. Under this healthy practice at the time of admission itself 30 students are allotted to each faculty, who are required to keep track of Mentees’ progress.The reports by the mentors are monitored by the respective Vice Principals as well as the IQAC.IQAC also keeps record of all the departmental activities. IQAC stressed the need to enhance student centric activities such as group discussions, PPT presentations, essay competitions, and integrating ICT in the teaching learning process. Maintenance of the electronic gadgets and equipments are also monitored by the IQAC. Every year Academic Audit is conducted twice in front of the invited academia as well as the stake holders. At the beginning of the academic year prospective plan of every department is presented and approved .At the end of the academic year a reconnaissance of the yearly academic activities is again taken up.

### 3. Research, Consultancy and Extension

#### 3.1 Initiatives of the IQAC in Sensitizing/Promoting Research Climate in the institution

IQAC plays a significant role in promoting research climate in the institution. IQAC provides guidance to faculty members in preparing research proposals and seeking Grants from various funding agencies. Shri Govindraja Bhatta, Shri Goverdhan Wankhede, Dr. Manekar, Dr. Ghatate, Dr. Jeevantare, Shri. Sahare, Dr. S. Ingle are awaiting their MRP approval from the UGC. 8 faculty members are pursuing their PhD and this year Dr. Alka Badge was awarded PhD in Marathi. The College is a renowned Centre for Higher Learning and Research for Commerce, English and Sociology, affiliated to R.T.M. Nagpur University. 50 researchers have enrolled in this centre and are availing the benefits provided by the institution. 11 faculty members of the college are PhD supervisors with nearly 28 students working under them. The institution has research committee to look after the research activities conducted in our college. IQAC coordinator Dr. Manjushree Sardeshpande and NAAC coordinator Dr. Manju Dubey are members of the research committee too.

Researchers are encouraged to exchange research related ideas and observations with peers and experts available in the institute. The findings of research work are published as research papers in peer reviewed journals and conference proceedings to make it widely available. This year 46 research papers were published by the faculty. Books were published by Dr. A. Badge and Dr. U. Datar. Minor Research projects and books with ISBN/ISSN publications are kept in the library for reference.

As a part of faculty development Dr. Manjushree Sardeshpande, Dr. V. Diwan, Shri. M. Pathak, Shri. G. Bhatta & Ms. Varsha Jape attended the refresher course in Research Methodology. Shri. Ajinkya Deshpande & Dr. Satish Chale attended their Oriented Programme.

Workshops / Training sessions are organized for the students and teachers. The Department of English, History, Music, Home Economics, Philosophy, Marathi conducted workshops this year. As part of the curriculum, some courses like B.B.A., B.C.C.A., B.A Psychology and M.Com, Women Development Cell have research projects, which are guided by the respective teachers. M.A English has a special paper on research methodology.

Researchers of eminence visit the campus and interact with teachers and students during workshops, seminars and conferences. To name a few, Dr. Khandait, Dr. Chopde were invited for Guest Lectures and Dr. S. Bhattacharya, Dr. Chukerbutty, Dr. N. Chotai were invited by the English Department in the college. Dr. Lende, Dr. M. Bande, Dr. V. S. Jog, Dr. Anmol Shende were the resource persons for the Seminar organised by the Marathi Department.

The IQAC takes initiative in conducting book reviews. All the faculty members review books with relevance to academic importance.

The College publishes a Multidisciplinary International Peer Reviewed Journal wherein the faculty gets an opportunity to publish their research papers.

The College spends generously on research activity. The management provides a sizable amount of financial grant towards travel, registration fees etc. 10 students from the Sanskrit department attended All India Sanskrit Youth festival which promotes students' talents. In order to enhance research and development activity the institution appropriately utilizes UGC funds every year. Special funds are allotted to procure required laboratory equipments as well as library books.

Wi-Fi campus and a well equipped library with latest and updated software help in facilitating and promoting research.

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

The faculty members of the institution conscientiously contributed towards social responsibility through nearly twelve different programmes.

- LASSY (Laxmi Saraswati Swavalamban Yojana):- It is an ‘Earn & Learn Scheme’ where students are given opportunity to earn on campus through simple assignments like data-entry, administrative work etc.
- MSMP (‘My Society My People’) – On the occasion of the Founders’Day, a cultural fete is organised by the students of the college. This year, in all 14 stalls were put up by the College students. The money generated through it was used for the extension activity of the college.(Health check-up and Spectacle Distribution) was done for the needy of Kachchipura locality)
- ‘Each One Help One’: - Study material is exchanged from senior students to junior students.
- Different Community Developmental activities at adjoining Kachchipura locality : Under this we have adopted part of Kachhipura in collaboration with NMC.
  - Sports Summer Camp was conducted by Shri.Goverdhan Wankhede for students of Kachipura locality .

- Blood Donation, Haemoglobin test, HIV testing & Blood Group check up : Every year Blood Donation camp is organised on 8<sup>th</sup> August in the memory of Late Resp. Shri Vinayakrao Phatak (Birth anniversary). This Camp was organised by NSS. 39 students & 3 faculty member donated blood on 8<sup>th</sup> August 2016.
- ‘Amrut Vyakhyan’ is organised once in every two years for getting insights into various social, cultural and moral issues. This year it was organized on 18 January 2017. Resp.Shri.B.Surendran was the Chief Guest, the topic was “Hon.Shri.Babu Jagjeevanram-Jeevan aur Karya ”

As is customary, this year also the stakeholders' input for curricular development is laudable. Our faculty members conducted several curriculum development activities. Some of them are listed below.

- Resource Material and model answer sets are given to students so that they have a ready study material for reference.
- ICT: Our College being facilitated with Smart classrooms & Wi-Fi, online learning resources are easily available to every student and Faculty member. "MOODLE" the new e-learning resource has been introduced in our institution from the current session which is a very innovative n handy learning resource for the students'. All faculty members have their individual Moodle account which is updated by them. The students who are unable to attend classes or those who are working can avail the benefits of studying the topics through Moodle. The regular students can also get a chance to revise the topic. OPAC facility is another library facility for scholars. E-Learning resources and resource material in the form of CD's and audio-visuals is provided to students at the under graduate level.
- General knowledge and thinking on basic rights among students, latest and amendments in IT and Corporate laws and newly amended rules are given to the students. Visits are organized to places of Cultural, Historical and commercial importance, Bio-diversity Farms, Industrial Hubs and places of social relevance to upgrade the subjective knowledge of students. The student contributions in the form of writings, posters, drawings, articles and photographs are selected and featured in the annual College Magazine '*Prerna*'.
- Remedial courses are conducted for the students whose performances are below the expected standards. Bridge courses are conducted to address the needs of the students getting admitted by opting for a change in their stream of studies.
- The holistic development of students in academic, as well as physical well-being is taken care of by the Institution. Apart from regular activities conducted by the Physical Education Department in our Gymnasium, session on Yoga is conducted for students and staff. International Yoga Day was observed in the college in which the concept of healthy mind in healthy body is emphasized..
- Updated Information on various government and non-government schemes and avenues of skill development are provided by arranging lectures and organising visits to the relevant concerns and institutions to enhance and adopt entrepreneurial skills.
- Our Institution boasts of having a fully equipped modern central library for the use of the entire Institution, providing facilities like M-OPAC and N-LIST offering easy access to electronic resources. We have a Library portal attached to the College website through which Library collection can be browsed as well as it is a gateway for direct link to various useful websites. New arrivals in Library are regularly displayed.
- Conducive work culture incorporating academics and life skills is inculcated in students by way of arranging community related social activities like 'LASSY' for children from Kachchipura slums, programmes highlighting self-governance as well as Nation building exercises like cleanliness campaign, anti-drug & anti-tobacco drives, and encouraging student involvement therein.
- Academic Audit was conducted in the presence of Management Members and External Peer team members. This was a good exercise in which every member and Department as a whole were provided a chance to explain their achievements after which valuable suggestions were given by the Peer members.

### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Teaching and Learning is a very dynamic activity, a remedial and knowledge up gradation process both for the Teacher & Taught. Academic Diary of this year was also prepared keeping in mind all these parameters. The following are some of the Teaching Learning activities conducted.

- ❖ ” “MOODLE” the new e-learning resource has been introduced in our institution from the current session which is a very innovative n handy learning resource for the students’. All faculty members have their individual Moodle account which is updated by them. he students who are unable to attend classes or those who are working can avail the benefits of studying the topics through Moodle.
- ❖ A Power point Presentation session was organised by Commerce Department on “Demonetization in India” for all the students of Arts and Commerce. Students put forth their views on Demonetization in an effective way.
- ❖ Need based PowerPoint presentations, Cyber-Aided learning resources are provided to update knowledge, to provide a wider spectrum of knowledge sources outside the syllabi, and also to make the subject topics more inspiring. Teaching is made more effective and student friendly by the use of ICT like Visualizer, online academic resources, educational CDs and use of Smart classrooms. Students are instructed to Prepare Charts, and graphs and
- ❖ In order to improve the language acquisition skills and writing skills among students various formats are designed in the Language lab for their benefit. Orell Digital Language a unique audio – video self-accessing technique for to language acquisition is used in the language lab. Laboratory Software is used along with online and offline internet resources.
- ❖ With the objective of cultivating habit of writing accurate point wise answers and improving the handwriting, the students are made to write assignments on topics of the subject of study. These are classroom assignments as well as home assignments which are evaluated.
- ❖ Audio- aids are provided to students in Music, English, Marathi, Sanskrit departments and also in Language Lab (microphones) to help them improve skills of recitation and accent modification.
- ❖ Regular in-house competitions are organized between Arts, Commerce and Professional courses Departments by way of group discussion & quiz competition to encourage healthy competition and up gradation of knowledge.
- ❖ We also encourage selective open book exam system.
- ❖ Re-examinations are conducted for students. This practice has been made mandatory for the students in order to get final clearance for the university exams. Alternate evaluation is another facility extended to our differently-abled students.
- ❖ In some classes traditional Blackboard teachings is carried on as this technique appears to be still effective to explain step by step problem solving. This also enables easy grasping of topics.
- ❖ Home Assignments and Projects are given to the students with an aim to make them study the topics and attempt descriptive answers along with improvement in handwriting, time management, and developing research techniques along with honing the skills of summarizing and critiquing.
- ❖ Guest Lectures were organised by Department of commerce on topics related to student development like “Updating Resume, Latest amendments in Company Law, Personality Development, Schemes of Government of India –Start up-Stand up India, Mudra etc.
- ❖ An Investor awareness programme sponsored by SEBI was also organised by Dept. of Commerce
- ❖ A healthy academic activity ‘Teacher for Today’ is another way of making students present topics they have learnt in front of the entire class with an intension of boosting



their confidence and also instilling creative Teaching Learning techniques from the student's point of view .

### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Our faculties conduct following activities in their respective classrooms in their own innovative ways:

1. Paper setting, Evaluation, Model Answer, Question Bank, Practical Examinations: The faculty members prepare question papers based on University pattern for all unit tests, half yearly and annual exams as per the college schedule. After the evaluation of papers the students are provided with model answers booklet so that students can analyze themselves and thus have a chance to understand the proper method of answering questions.
2. Focus on handwriting. Students are stressed upon the importance of legible and good writing through paragraph writings, home assignments and articles in regular college hours.
3. Internal Practical Exams for all UG students from BCCA, Music, Psychology, Home Economics, Sanskrit Lit. along with Internal viva voce for all UG courses as per Semester pattern prescribed by RTM Nagpur University & also for PG courses are conducted as per University schedule. Sessions of mock practical exams are arranged for the students to alleviate the fear of Viva-Voce
4. Chapter-wise exam & evaluations are conducted along with weekly tests for practical subjects to improve the practical knowledge among students
5. Students are given practical demonstration of theory based syllabus like Banking and Stock Exchange transactions, Filing of Tax Returns, Film Theory, Phonetic Drills etc.

### 6.3.4 Research and Development

We are an authorized ***Centre for Higher Learning and Research***. Our Faculty members are involved in constructive research activities, some of them are recorded below.

1. Use of statistical information and data analysis is incorporated for knowledge dissemination.
2. Guidance to Research Students and Research activities through independent research centre: We have RTM Nagpur University approved research centre for the subjects of Commerce, English and Sociology. For each registered student; facilities necessary for research like, free access to e-resources through Nlist database is provided with individual ID and Password, Research library, Wi-Fi and other relevant resources are provided. Ample research opportunity is provided to research students. Some of our faculty members are registered students at our Research Centre for their research studies.

3. Faculty members are encouraged to guide M.Phil. and MBA students from other institutions to prepare dissertation and projects.
4. Curriculum related research facility and activity by way of providing guidance to BBA & BCCA final year students and IV Semester M.Com. and all PG courses is extended to students for preparing dissertations and project reports to be submitted to the University.
5. In addition to this, in the Institution, individual projects are prepared by students of Women Development Cell & Population Education Programme under the *Adult and Continuing Education Programme* of RTMNU and also projects on Environment Science.. The projects are prepared on social issues as instructed by University. This helps in creating social awareness among students and encourages efforts from them to address these social issues.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

**2. My Society My People (MSMP) :** Every year our institution organizes a “Cultural Fete” (on the occasion of Founders’ Day) in which students of the senior and junior college put up various stalls, and the money generated from this activity is used for the Health check-up and Medicine distribution to the needy people of kachchipura locality. This year Eye Check-up and Spectacle distribution activity was conducted.

**3. Students welfare Activities:** Seeking welfare of the students is an important part of our institution.

(a) Our institution waives the fees of meritorious and economically backward students. Many students got benefitted by this facility.

(b) RTMNU runs the **Students Welfare Scheme** in which such students are given scholarship who are economically backward and don’t have access to avail the facility of government scholarship, our institution guides them and helps them to avail this facility. Total 72 students got benefitted in the academic year 2016-17. Total of Rs 3,43,500 distributed.



(c) LASSY ( Laxmi Sarswati Swavlamban Yojna): This scheme facilitates opportunity of earning while learning. The main objective of the scheme is to develop a student as a multifaceted personality with academic excellence. Students are given opportunity to earn in campus through simple assignments like data-entry, administrative work etc.

(d) **‘Each One Help One’**: - This activity aims to help others to grow. It is a student’s initiative in which Study materials are exchanged from senior students to junior students.

**4. ICT:** Our Institution makes very effective use of ICT in teaching and learning process.

(a) Screening of plays for the Students, movies related with ‘Film Studies’ were also screened for PG students.

(b) PPT Presentation is given regularly by the students.

**5. Environmental awareness activities:**

(a) Our Institution has formed a Nature Club “Shrishti” which monitors the ecology of the college.

(b) Vermicompost: By decomposing organic material vermicompost is produce and used for the plants in the college premises.

(c) Institution is no Plastic Zone; Students are encouraged to avoid use of plastic in the college premises.

(d) Institution has a tie up with E-waste Re- cycling unit.

(e) Tree Plantation: The activity of tree plantation was conducted by the NSS unit of the college.

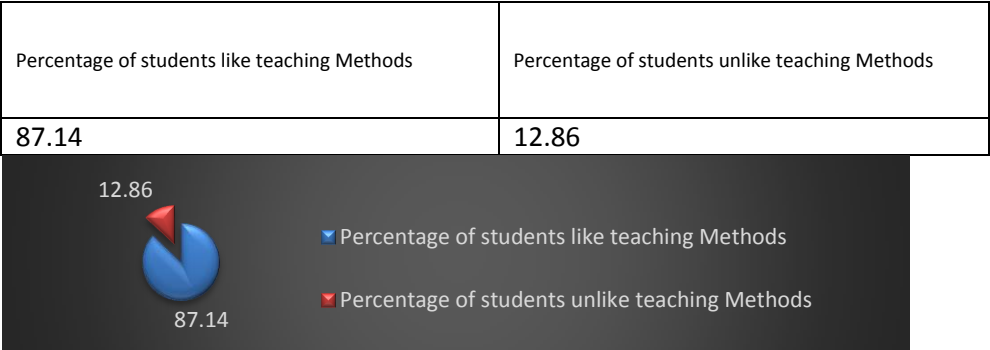

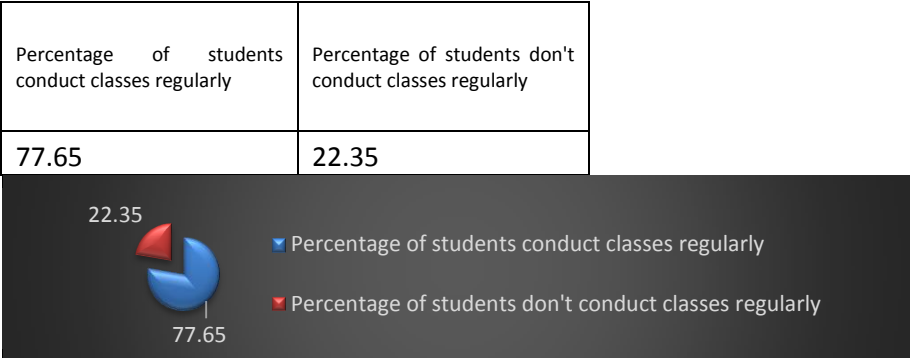
Feedback collected from the students on-line and off-line represented in Percentage. (140, Respondents)



1. Percentage of students like teaching Methods. (140, Respondents)

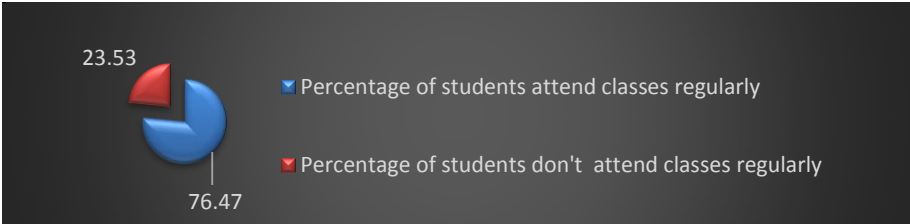


2. Percentage of students conduct classes regularly.(140, Respondents)



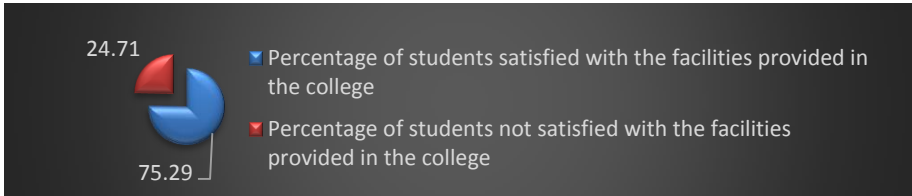
3. Percentage of students attend classes regularly.(140, Respondents)

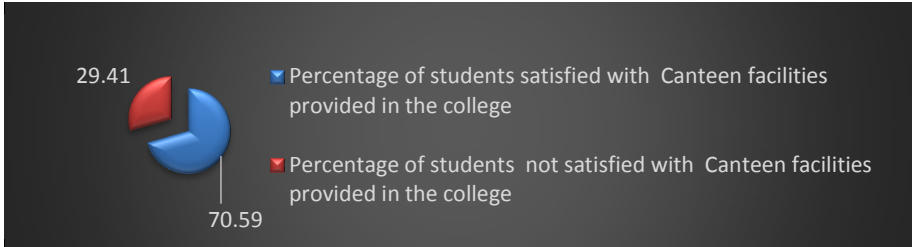
4. Percentage of students satisfied with the facilities provided in the college. (140, Respondents)

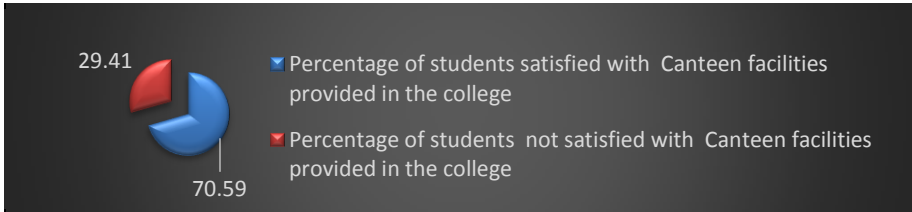
5. Percentage of students satisfied with Canteen facilities provided in the college. (140, Respondents)

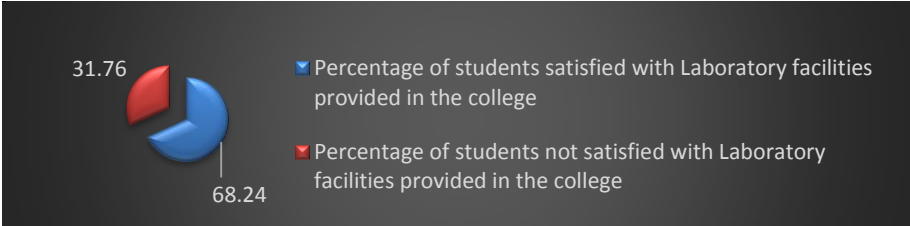
6. Percentage of students satisfied with Library facilities provided in the college. (140, Respondents)

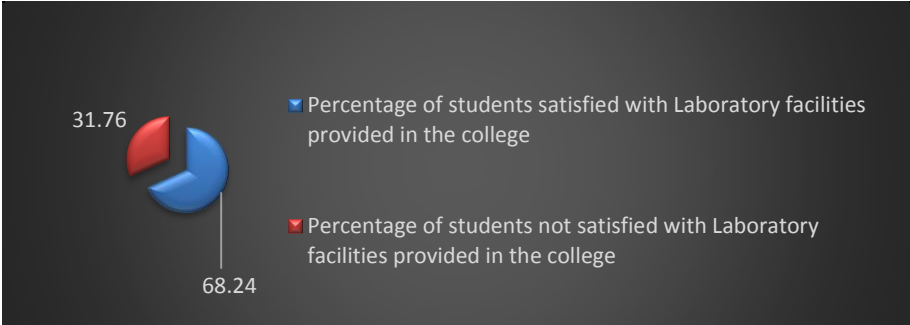
7. Percentage of students satisfied with Laboratory facilities provided in the college. (140, Respondents)

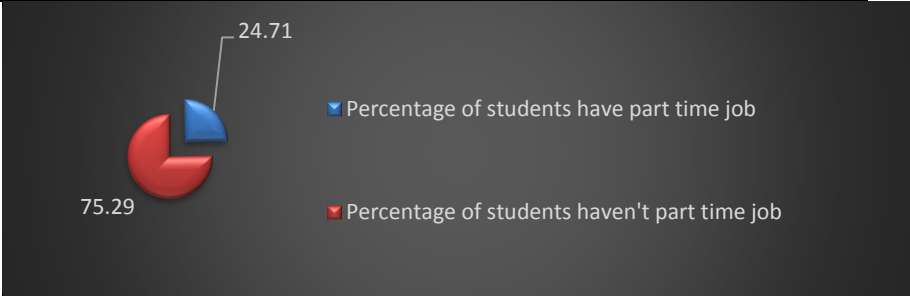
8. Percentage of students Participate in co-curricular activities of the college. (140, Respondents)

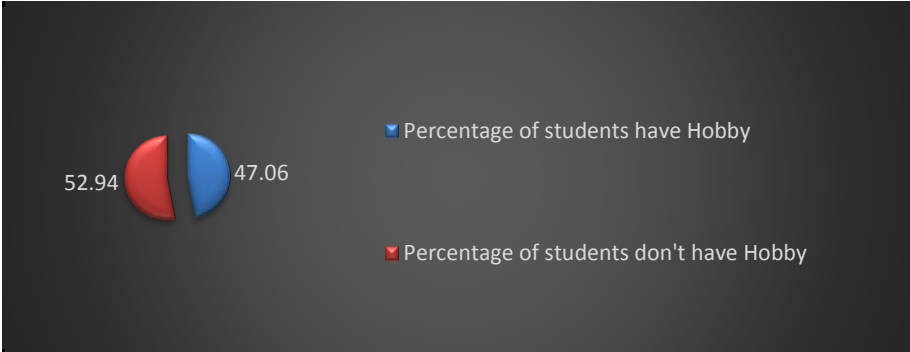
9. Percentage of students have part time job. (140, Respondents)

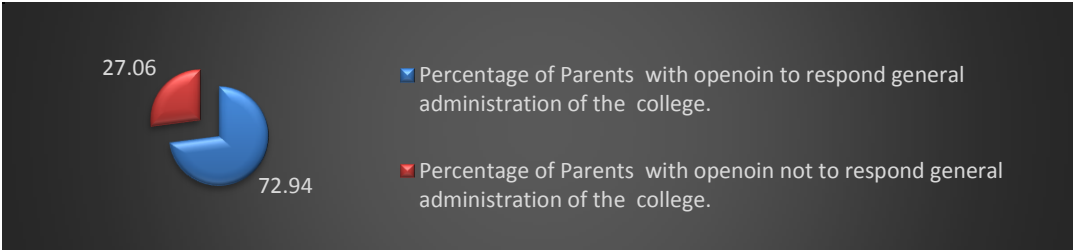
3. Percentage of Parents with opinion to respond general administration of the college.(120, Respondents)

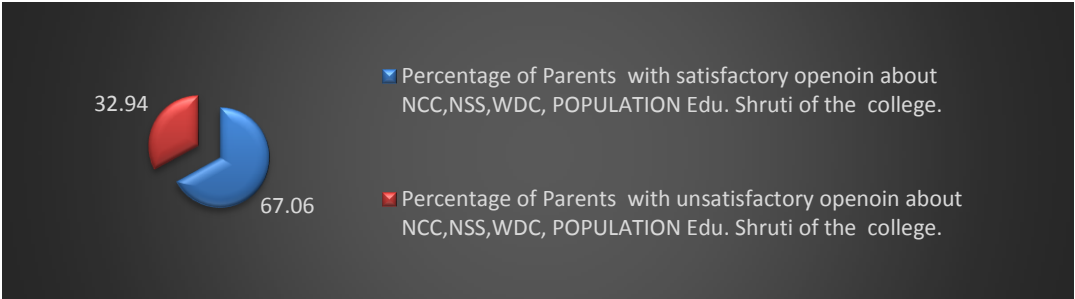
4. Percentage of Parents with opinion to respond general administration of the college. (120, Respondents)

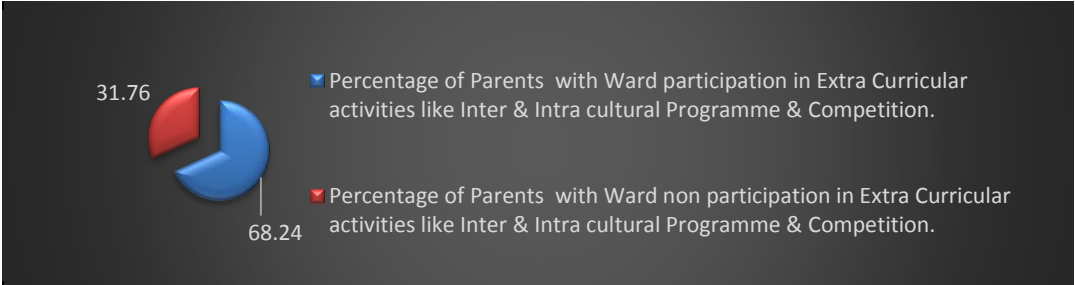
5. Percentage of Parents with satisfactory opinion about NCC,NSS,WDC, POPULATION Edu. Shruti of the college.(120, Respondents)

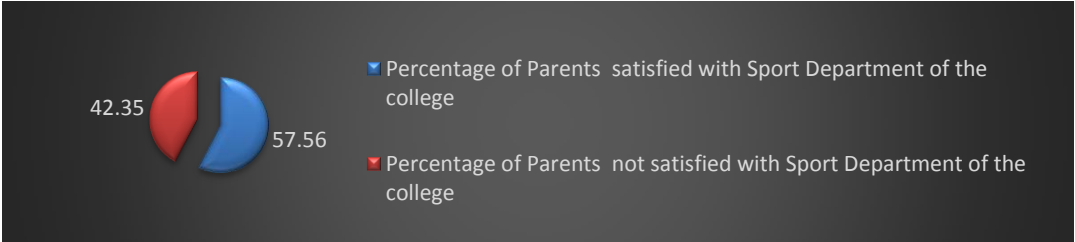
6. Percentage of Parents with Ward participation in Extra Curricular activities like Inter & Intra cultural Programme & Competition.(120, Respondents)

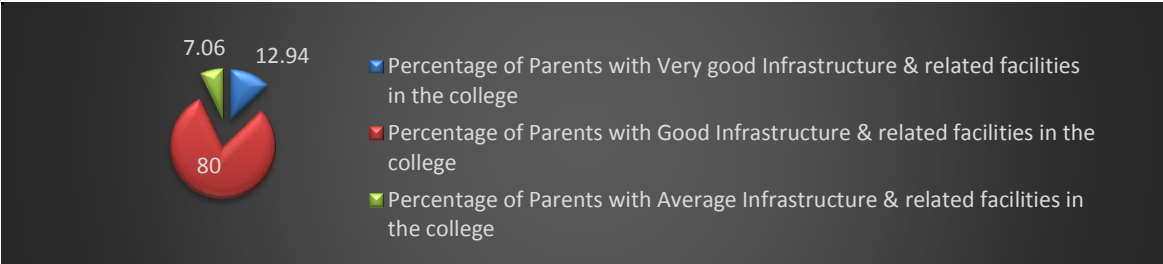
7. Percentage of opinion of Parents with Infrastructure & related facilities in the college. (120, Respondents)

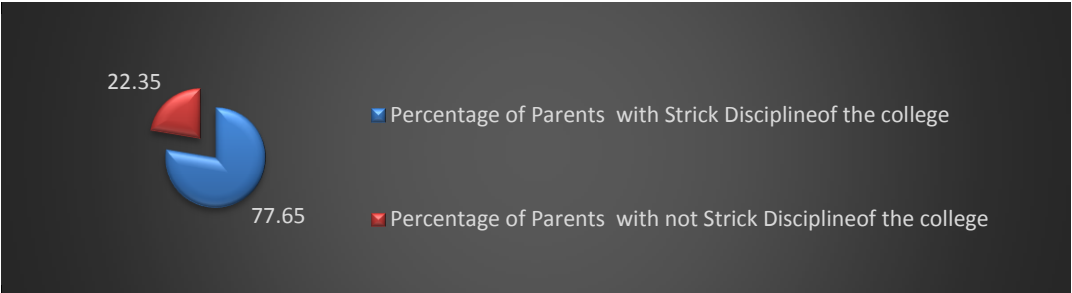

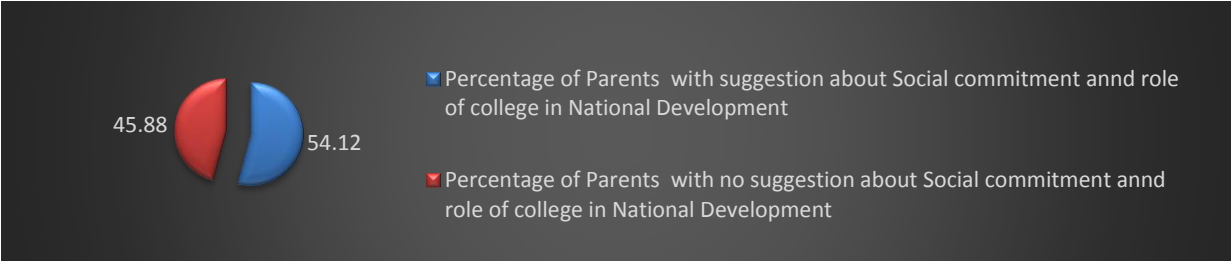
9. Percentage of Parents with Strict Discipline of the college. (120, Respondents)
